

COMPARATIVE ADJECTIVES

PART I

RULE 1

To form the comparatives, -er is added to one-syllable adjectives.



soft - softer
Susan's pillow is soft,
but Mary's pillow is softer.



dark - darker
Mark's bedroom is dark,
but Paul's bedroom is darker.

RULE 2

For one-syllable adjectives that end in -e, only -r is added.



safe - safer
The Bluemont neighborhood is safe,
but the Wilshire neighborhood is safer.



cute - cuter
Julie's teddy bear is cute,
but Emily's teddy bear is cuter.

RULE 3

For one-syllable adjectives that end with one consonant preceded by one vowel, the final consonant is doubled, and -er is added.



big - bigger
Mr. Miller's house is big,
but Mr. Wilson's house is bigger.



thin - thinner
Brenda is thin,
but Helen is thinner.

RULE 4

For two-syllable adjectives that end in -y, the -y changes to -i and -er is added.



pretty - prettier

Janet's garden is pretty,
but Kelly's garden is prettier.



crazy - crazier

My neighbor is crazy,
but your neighbor is crazier!
